
Hallowe'en Walk Around the Block

NEWS from Room 205

It has been a wonderful first two weeks of learning here in room 205! Already, we have done so much, such as "Scientist In The School" and "SNAP" (Stop Now And Plan.)

On Monday, September 11, when Scientist Peter came to our class, we learned about Forensic Science, and investigated a crime scene. The workshop was called 'Clued In To Forensic Science'....

Scenario: A valuable classroom picture is missing from its frame, and the surrounding crime scene

yields many clues.



We examined footprints and fingerprints. We investigated an unknown powder and a fibre that looked a lot like somebody's hair! We tested a black pen on special type of paper. We analyzed all our data. We all wrote down the ransom note for proof that we weren't the criminal. Through detailed investigation, we found out that the suspect who everyone thought was the criminal ended up being framed! It was an amazing learning and team building experience for our class. We really enjoyed investigating samples and collecting and analyzing evidence from the crime scene in our groups.



On Tuesday, a Community Child Worker named Rolando came to our class from a program called "SNAP." He introduced himself and told us a little bit about the program. We did some cool Math games, and were taught about problem solving. For the next 9 weeks Rolando will be coming to our class, to teach us more about self-control and decision making. He will also be visiting other classrooms here at Kimberley Public School.



We had so much fun with this activity, and we can't wait for the exciting upcoming events as the school year progresses!!!

Dear Colin.

Thank you for the letter you wrote to the Honourable Jane Philpott, Minister of Health, about smoking in Canada. I have been asked to respond on the Minister's behalf. I am sorry it has taken so long to get back to you.

It is always a pleasure to hear from students like you, who are taking an active interest in the issues that matter to them.

Health Canada is also concerned about Canadians getting sick because of smoking. Smoking is the leading cause of early death in Canada. It plays a role in causing over 40 diseases and other serious health problems, including cancer, lung problems, and heart disease, leading to suffering for thousands of Canadians, their friends and family.

Like you, Health Canada is also concerned about second-hand smoke and considers it to be a very important issue. Breathing in second-hand smoke should be avoided as much as possible because it contains over 4,000 chemicals, many of which can cause cancer.

The idea of banning cigarettes was considered a long time ago. Unfortunately, tobacco use was very popular before we knew its harmful effects. Today, over 4.6 million Canadians still use tobacco products, and many of them are addicted. As such, it would be very difficult to make smoking illegal. Instead of a full ban, the Government of Canada is working very hard to help people quit smoking, and to prevent people from starting in the first place.
