

interviews. Progress reports will be sent home on Tuesday, November 11. Here are some questions and tips that you may find useful for the interview.

<u>Great Questions to Ask At Parent-</u> <u>Teacher Interviews</u>

What skills does my child need to work on?
What activities can we do at home to

strengthen those skills?

► Does my child complete his/her work and assignments efficiently and conscientiously?

► Is my child facing any struggles in class not related to her/his schoolwork?

Interview Tips

Talk to your child about school before the interview. Ask how they think they are doing and how the teacher can help them meet their goals.
Make a list of what you want to know before you go into the interview. Knowing what you want to know and writing it down ensures that

you don't forget anything, and that you get the information you need.

©Be open and honest; feel free to add your own observations around your child's behaviour, strengths and weaknesses.

©Find out what they're learning. Ask curriculum questions, find out what your child has learned and what is coming up in the term ahead. Know the skills your child will need to be successful in the term ahead (i.e. knowing how to multiply and divide fractions).

⊙Ask if your child is completing his/her homework regularly, how long the work assigned should take to complete. The answers to these questions will help you better monitor your child's work habits.

⊙Ask what you can do at home to help your child. Make a commitment to support your child's learning.

Student Safety

We remind all parents/guardians that student supervision starts at 8:30 am on the pavement at the back of the school. Students must arrive between 8:30 and 8:45 a.m., <u>not before</u>.

At the end of the school day, there is teacher supervision on the pavement by the portables from 3:30 to 3:45 pm. Please note that the apparatus is not supervised after 3:30 p.m. dismissal time.

French Programs Application Deadline

For families interested in the Toronto District School Board's French Immersion or Extended French programs, TDSB offers an online process for applying to:

• Early French Immersion (EFI) which begins in Senior Kindergarten;

• Junior Extended French (JEF) which begins in Grade 4

• Middle Immersion which begins in Grade 4 (available in a limited number of schools)

TDSB guarantees an offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) to all on-time applicants.

Transportation is provided as per the Board's Transportation policy.

This year, there is an important change to the timelines for applying for these programs for September 2015.

• Applications for Early French Immersion (for a Junior Kindergarten aged child), must be completed online between November 3rd 2014 and December 5th 2014.

• Applications for Junior Extended French or Middle French Immersion (for a child currently in Grade 3), must be completed online between January 5th 2015 and January 29th 2015.

Offers of placement within your chosen program will be made to all on-time applicants in the weeks following the close of the application window.

Please note: families with an older sibling currently in a French program are still required to complete an online application for the new student.
